Chairman's Report

It is with great pleasure that I deliver my first annual report as Chairman of the South Metro Junior Football League (SMJFL). To be elected as Chairman was and is an honour. 2015 has seen a changing of the guard with none of the original 7 board members from 2011 now on the Board. I would like to openly thank them for their courage and fortitude to make the structural changes in 2010/2011, which has provided the SMJFL with the foundations to grow and prosper into the successful league you see today. Those foundations will continue to be built upon, as has occurred this year and into the future.

The Board continues to focus on delivering our mission, 'to provide kids a safe, supportive and inclusive environment which develops, promotes and encourages participation in Australian Rules football'. The Board believes by adhering to our values we are on the right path to fulfil this mission.

The Board this year embraced a new league motto, 'It's about the kids', and asked our member clubs to do the same. The response to this small change has been overwhelming. What we have seen is small incremental changes at member clubs ensuring that decisions made now are assessed always bearing in mind that 'It's about the kids'. It certainly has impacted on decisions made at board meetings.

The 2015 season saw over 9,500 registered players from 27 member clubs and six municipalities participate in over 3,000 games across 53 competitions. The league was pleased to have Youth Girls (U18s) teams for the first time with three teams participating in the Yarra Junior Football League competition. With a total of 23 girls only teams competing this season – the same number as the 2014 season – the league has employed a part-time Girls Football Coordinator whose main focus leading into the 2016 season is to assist clubs with the recruitment of players.

One of the most important aspects of delivering such an immense competition is to ensure everyone has an opportunity to play. We know that we have delivered here with the sheer number of registered players participating. What was just as pleasing is that 25 of the 27 member clubs were represented in a final in U11 to U17's and that 18 member clubs had at least one team as premiers; that's diversity.

The SMJFL simply does not run without our umpires and numerous volunteers. To our 370 league umpires, who I call our 28th club; their camaraderie and support for each other and the banter between them is just like what happens in any team at member clubs. They were ably supported by 267 club volunteer umpires looking after the U8 to U10's. All our umpires did a wonderful job in what is often seen as a thankless task, but always remember, no match begins without an umpire!! Then there is the volunteer and support crew at each club, starting with club committees, game day officials, parents, family, friends & supporters, it is this club fabric that makes the league so strong and Australian Rules football such a great game to play and be associated with.

There were some successful new initiatives delivered in 2015. First, the appointment of an Incident Officer at each club. This initiative has allowed clubs to discuss and formulate appropriate sanctions for minor indiscretions. Second, the SMJFL ran the Interleague program internally in 2015, with the new banner of the South Metro Stars. The member clubs, parents and players who were involved, were thrilled with how the program was delivered. The Board is extremely proud of how the Stars represented the league at every outing.

The Board has prepared and presented the SMJFL Sustainability Strategy 2015. This document shall provide structure and guidance for the future development and strengthening of the league. We



would like to thank our member clubs for their input during the various consultation sessions that occurred. We also thank the other stakeholders both inside & outside of the football domain that provided input.

We are lucky at the SMJFL to have such a hard working executive team that allows for the delivery of the above. I would like to acknowledge their contribution in 2015. Ably led by General Manager, Jake McCauley, who was supported by Football Operations Manager, Emily McIntyre, Director of Umpiring, Amanda Beet, and Marketing & Administration Coordinator, Zoe Driver. Without the commitment of this executive team, a successful season such as we had in 2015 would not be possible.

On behalf of the SMJFL Board I'd like to thank and acknowledge our ongoing close working relationship with the AFL, AFL Victoria, St. Kilda FC, Melbourne FC, SFNL, VAFA and the support of our corporate partners, interleague coaches and support staff.

I personally would like to thank my fellow board members who make this role so enjoyable. To my Vice Chairman, Michael Osborne, thank you for your support during my first year, to Cr. Felicity Frederico, Paul O'Toole, Rob Aivatoglou, Lewis Bearman, thank you all; we banter, we discuss, we make decisions but most importantly we walk out as one. We are a team.

To Felicity & Paul who are retiring at this year's AGM, a special thank you for your significant contributions over the past 3 years. Paul with his knowledge of club administration and football has been an active member in the Football Talent & Pathway committee each year, while Felicity's knowledge of local government and passion for girls' football has seen her be an active member in our Stakeholders & Corporate Governance committees. I wish them both well in the future.

I look forward to another exciting year in 2016, when once again, 'It's about the kids'.

General Manager's Report

I am pleased to present my fourth report as General Manager of the South Metro Junior Football League.

In the short history (2012-15) of the SMJFL, 2015 has been the best year so far; with success for the league both on and off the field.

On the field the SMJFL continues to grow with 399 SMJFL teams participating in 2015. With 366 boys/mixed teams, this makes the SMJFL the largest boys/mixed junior football competition in Australia. Girls' football continues to be a key strategic priority of the league and we hope to grow this next year with inaugural Under 9 & Youth Girls (Under 18) competitions. The league also continues to have the best grading of any junior league in Melbourne.

Off the field the league continues to have the strongest partners program of any junior league in Melbourne. Additionally, the SMJFL remains a junior sport industry-leader with initiatives such as:

- SMJFL Sustainability Strategy
- SMJFL Player Retention Working Party
- SMJFL Match Day Behaviour Working Party
- SMJFL Girls Football Working Party
- SMJFL Secretaries Scoop & Secretaries Corner
- SMJFL Grading & Margin Analysis
- **SMJFL Surveys**
 - End of Season (Club) Coaches
 - Players (U14-U17) Player (Girls)
 - Club Volunteer Umpires League Umpires

These initiatives allow the league to continue to provide best practices in junior sport and by doing so achieve the league vision; 'to be the most respected independent junior sporting league nationally'.

Quality League Management Program

This year the SMJFL again received a perfect score (100%) in the Quality League Management Program. AFL Victoria's initiative is an annual assessment of league governance and administration. This is the second year in a row that the SMJFL has scored 100%.

Quality Club Program

Any football league, whether a community league or the AFL, is only as strong as its weakest Club. The SMJFL is fortunate to have twenty-seven junior football clubs that are well administered. This is reflected by the fact that the SMJFL is one of only two leagues in Australia to have every member club accredited in the AFL Swisse Quality Club Management Program.

However, with a new program recently announced, the SMJFL will be working closely with member clubs to ensure we continue to have 100% accreditation.

Community & Social Engagement

In 2015, the SMJFL continued its partnership with its official charity, Robert Connor Dawes Foundation (RCD Foundation, formerly 'RCD Fund'). The purpose of the partnership is to assist the RCD Foundation in raising awareness for brain cancer and to donate fundraising monies to the organization so they can continue to support brain matters in research, care and development.

This year, the partnership expanded to include RCD Foundation logo on all SMJFL match footballs (used in over 3,000 matches). Additionally, the SMJFL implemented the following:

Fundraising

The SMJFL community raised \$4,141.45 for RCD Foundation. This take the two-year total to over \$8,100.

Branding

- Grey tape worn on the playing jumpers of all SMJFL JDL Strategies Lightning Carnival players
- RCD Foundation branding and advertisement via the website and key events such as the JDL Strategies Lightning Carnivals & the SMJFL MONJON / JDL Strategies Finals Series

On behalf of the league, I'd like to thank the RCD Volunteers and in particular Liz Dawes (Executive Director, RCD Foundation), for their tireless work.

SMJFL Sustainability Strategy

A major project undertaken this year was the SMJFL Sustainability Strategy. The strategy document is the first of its kind, so no-one could've predicted how big an undertaking this would be. Hundreds of working hours were invested by the project managers, SMJFL board & administration, member clubs and football stakeholders. The result is a document that will guide junior football in this region for the short, medium and long-term.

By the AFL's own reckoning, the project is thought-leading and another example of the SMJFL being a dynamic and progressive league. All stakeholders can be proud of their input into a document that could be used by many other junior football leagues around the country.

The report lists 13 recommendations for the league, clubs and stakeholders to aspire to achieve. 2016 will see the league start to work towards achieving the recommendations.

I'd like to thank Richard Simon (Simon Leisure) for his exceptional work as Project Manager. Richard went above and beyond in his expected duties and the final report has been discussed for potential awards in 2016.

On behalf of Richard and the SMJFL, we thank all stakeholders for their attendance, cooperation and significant input into developing the report.







Lastly, one of the great benefits of the SMJFL Sustainability Strategy has been that the project has brought member clubs and the league board/administration closer together. While the league has always enjoyed a positive bond with the Clubs, the relationship between the league and clubs has never been stronger. This provides a foundation for the league to achieve great things over the coming years.

AFL Junior Match Policy

2015 marked the second season of the AFL Junior Match Policy implementation in the SMJFL. The AFL and Deakin University conducted a thorough two-year research project into the effectiveness of the new rules and the SMJFL was one of the leagues researched. The results showed that the SMJFL rules and implementation of the rules were the benchmark for other leagues to aspire to.

These results couldn't have been achieved without the efforts of the club administrators, coaches and players, who participated in accordance with the rules. Finally, thank you to the wonderful Club Volunteer Umpires who officiated the matches and ensured the kids had the best possible playing experience.

Player Retention Working Party (PRWP)

The PRWP continued its third year of work and in 2015 implemented a number of key initiatives, which were:

1. Colts Representative Match vs. YJFL

The inaugural Colts Representative Match was deemed as huge success by all participants. The league has committed to continuing with the initiative next year and would like to thank all clubs, officials and players for their support of the concept in 2015.

2. Player Survey (Under 14-Under 17)

The Player Surveys have now provided the league with over 1,300 responses in the past three years. This feedback has been vital in assisting the league to make changes to the structure of the competition.

3. Pre-Season Coaches' meeting

The pre-season coaches meeting was held for the first time, with over 95% of the league's 399 coaches in attendance. This forum will be continued in 2016 and provides the league with direct access to the most influential people on match day; the coaches.

4. Set time for all Under 17 matches

Consistent match times were trialled, with games scheduled close to 2pm this year. The league now has year-to-year comparisons from mid-morning matches (2014, 11am) and afternoon matches (2015, 2pm).

5. Presidents' Dinner

Expanded this year to include more club representatives and league corporate partners. A wonderful way to wrap up the season.

6. Player recognition Initiatives

The following number of players, that have played 7 & 10 years within the SMJFL / MSJFL, have been formally recognised:

a. 10-year players: 70b. 7-year players: 429

Pleasingly, in 2015 the SMJFL had 20 Under 17 teams, which is the highest amount of Under 17 teams in the history of the league. This is a reflection of the work of both the PRWP and the clubs, to increase player retention through older age groups.



Use of the SMJFL website continued to grow in 2015, with 3.72 million hits from 1 January 2015 to 30 September 2015. An increase of 12.3% from the same period in 2014.

Staff

I would like to thank my wonderful staff for their efforts this year. The league is fortunate to have such capable and committed staff.

Emily McIntyre furthered her development this year and on a number of occasions acted as the interim GM. Emily is responsible for the scheduling, grading and managing of over 3,000 matches a season and she continues to prove why she is one of the leading Football Operations Managers in metropolitan Melbourne.

The league has benefited enormously from having a full year with Zoe Driver as the Marketing & Administration Coordinator. Zoe has taken our administration, events and corporate partnership management to the next level and is a valued asset of the team.

The Director of Umpiring role saw three people move through the position this year. Olivia Crowe was employed from October 2014 to April 2015, before resigning due to health issues. A familiar face in Bernadette Vaux filled the role in an interim capacity from April to July. The league thanks Bernadette for filling the role, as the success of the 2015 season couldn't have been achieved without her contribution. In late June, Amanda Beet joined the SMJFL as the Director of Umpiring. Amanda has moved seamlessly into the role and has become an important team member. In 2016 she will act as both the Director of Umpiring and the Director of Interleague.

Lastly, thanks to Bruce Eckersall (SMJFL Accounts), Tim Marshall (SMJFL Interleague, Director of Coaching), Stephen Zayler (SMJFL Interleague Coordinator), Thomas Grundy (SMJFL Moorleigh Ground Manager) and Olivia Clarke (SMJFL Media Coordinator) for their contributions this year.

Board

On behalf of the league, thank you to the Board for their efforts and support this year. The league is blessed to have such talented and committed Directors, who volunteer their time to ensure that the league continues to be one of the leading junior leagues in the country; while always acting with the league's tagline "It's about the kids" in mind.

Club Committee Members

Thank you and well done to the approximate 300 club committee members that manage 27 Clubs, 399 teams and 9,500+ players. The success of the league cannot be achieved without your ongoing efforts.

Volunteer hours are the most precious asset a club has and so every decision the league administration makes, it makes it with the thought of club volunteers in mind. A number of initiatives this year – such as combining two events to the one night (AGM & Partners Trade Show), or combining communication to one email or website address (Secretaries' Scoop & Corner) – were aimed at reducing the administration burden. We look forward to working with clubs to further reduce club administration.

Club Volunteers

The league couldn't operate without the dedication and input of thousands of volunteers every year and so I would like to thank and pay tribute to the people that assist the SMJFL in providing opportunities for over 9,500 players to play every weekend. Volunteers are the lifeblood of community sport so thank you for your commitment to the SMJFL and the great game of Australian Rules Football.

Stakeholders

Finally, thank you to all key stakeholders in the region, which includes the AFL, AFL Victoria, AusKick centres, senior competitions (VAFA & SFNL) and their Clubs, TAC Cup Clubs, local Councils, state & federal MP's, St Kilda FC & Melbourne FC. While Australian Rules football continues to grow within the region, challenges remain. So a collaborative approach, with strong partnerships & pathways, is needed to ensure that the sport remains strong and vibrant at all levels within the region.

Summary

The 2015 season was a great year and lays a strong base for the future of the SMJFL. The league looks forward to working to achieve its vision and become 'the most respected independent junior sporting league nationally'.

Operations Report

The 2015 season again saw an increase in team numbers meaning even more hours from our dedicated club and parent volunteers who I'd like to thank for their time and efforts throughout the season.

Girls Football

Girls team numbers remained stagnant in 2015 with 23 teams again taking to the field each week. Pleasingly, for the first time, we fielded three Youth Girls (U18 teams) teams. Unfortunately, we couldn't quite get enough teams for our own competition but a big thank you to Shaun Dowling and Peter Nicholls from the Yarra Junior Football League for hosting Highett, St Peters & eventual premiers East Brighton Vampires in their Sunday competition. The SMJFL has established a Girls' Footy Working Party and employed a part-time Girls Football Coordinator (Stephen Zayler) to assist clubs with retention and recruitment of players for the 2016 season.

Melbourne Football Club continued as the community partner of Girls Football, this year becoming the naming rights sponsors of our U15 girls' competitions. A big thanks Debbie Lee and the team for their ongoing efforts in supporting SMJFL to grow junior girls' football within our region.

Interleague

2015 was a big year for Interleague with the SMJFL taking over the running of the U14 & U15 boys for the first time. The SMJFL would like to thank Sandringham Dragons for their work in this space over a number of years and we look forward to a fruitful partnership moving forward. Further details on each of the Interleague campaigns – including the U16 Girls' first ever win – can be found later in this Annual Report.

Lightning Carnivals

With 142 mixed and 7 girls teams participating this year, the Lightning Carnivals were an enormous success. A huge thanks to Port Melbourne, Bentleigh, Prahran and Highett for hosting this year's events.

Congratulations to all the teams for their efforts during the season.

Finals Series

The finals were again a success with 25 out of 27 clubs having at least one team participating at the 'business end' of the season, and 18 clubs having at least one a premiership winning team.






Thanks to Ajax, Bentleigh, Caulfield Bears, East Sandringham, Hampton Rovers, Highett, Mordialloc-Braeside, Mt Waverley, Northvale, Oakleigh, Prahran & Waverley Park for playing host to a record 84 Semi & Preliminary Finals. Grand Finals were hosted at Trevor Barker Oval (Sandringham Zebras FC), Meade Reserve (Clayton FC), Mentone Grammar (Old Mentonians FC) and, for the first time since the league introduced gated venues, Toorak Park (Prahran) and Jack Barker Oval (Cheltenham FC). Thanks to all host clubs for helping make the 2015 final series a success.



Team Numbers

SMJFL team numbers continued their upward trend in 2015 with a total of 399 teams participating in 53 competitions.








Grading

2015 was the first season clubs were asked to select their own grades for age groups up to U13s (previously just modified rules). This proved to be a great success with the average margins for U11-U13 age groups decreasing from 38.9 in 2014 to 34.9 in 2015. Overall, average margins from U10-U17s decreased from 43.6 to 40.6. Significantly, our oldest girls age group (U15 in 2015 & U16 in 2014) saw a massive decrease from 61.1 points per game down to 41.6 points per game. To prove there is always room for improvement, disappointingly, the U14 competition saw a large jump.



For the first time, margins have also been broken down into prior to (rounds 1-4) and after (rounds 4+) regrading. In the vast majority of age groups, margins decreased significantly after round 4 which shows the league's re-grading process works.


Discipline


Umpires were this year asked to rate the behaviour of players, officials and spectators either 'good', 'fair' or 'poor' for each game throughout the season. This was one of the main initiatives of the Match Day Behaviour Working Party and one that will be continued in the future. Congratulations to Hampton Rovers, St Peters & Ajax for taking out the top 3 places in the award for the club with the best average rating across all teams. The league was happy to have 22 of our 27 clubs score above 98% for Good-Fair match-day behaviour ratings.

The league encouraged each club to have a dedicated Incident Officer in 2015, someone who would be the first point of call for clubs to deal with issues throughout the season. Whilst there's always room for improvement, overall, this initiative was seen as a success. Thanks to all those that gave up their time for what can be a very time consuming role.

Sam Hatzi took on the role of SMJFL Tribunal Chairperson on a permanent basis which led to more consistent processes and outcomes throughout the season. A big thanks to Sam and all our other wonderful Tribunal members who give up their time on a regular basis.

Umpiring Report

During the 2015 season 267 club volunteer (adult) umpires were accredited to officiate in the mixed U8-10 and Under 12 Girls modified rules competitions, a similar number to 2014. Around one quarter of these were continuing on from the year before, showing that clubs were actively recruiting new parents in this challenging yet rewarding role, as well as retaining many parents who were happy to continue umpiring.



On game days these umpires (one per team) worked together to officiate matches and provide encouragement and guidance to our youngest players, with the view of maximising their enjoyment of the game they were being introduced to, and developing their base skills – in order that these can be built on once they 'graduate' from modified rules into the more traditional form of the game.

Based on feedback from a survey conducted mid-season, 75% of club umpires stated that the most enjoyable thing about the role was participating in their child's sport. In addition, 43% stated that teaching players and watching them improve during the season was also a highlight. Unfortunately, it was fairly easy to predict that the least enjoyable part of the job, according to most responses, was negative parent behaviour on the sidelines.

SMJFL Umpire Retention

One of the major indicators of the success of the 2013 Umpiring Department restructure was to be the number of umpires who chose to return in 2014.

2015, as in 2014 saw 65% of the total number of registered umpires having umpired previously – despite reducing the training schedule to only once per week. Obviously having a base of umpires who have officiated at least one previous season results in a higher level of match day skill and knowledge. Many of these umpires also attained their AFL Level 1 Umpiring accreditation in line with our aim to have a minimum of 50% of any 2nd year umpires accredited by the end of the season.

SMJFL Umpire Coaching Team / Training

The umpire coaching team continued to develop under the guidance of new Head Coach, David Anselmi. This included ensuring all of our coaches are accredited to a minimum Level 1 standard which we believe is vital to maintaining a solid grounding for our umpires.

In 2015, the SMJFL Umpiring Department operated 2 training academies, one at East Bentleigh (Moorleigh Reserve) for all umpires and the other at St Bedes College in Mentone. The St Bedes academy was provided only for students at the school, and was formed in response to a number of students at the school expressing interest in umpiring.

Our 'girls only' field umpire coaching team once again provided a comfortable environment for females to learn the skills of field umpiring without feeling intimidated by males who form the vast majority of numbers in field umpires. This team was led by coach Shannon Kirkby, an exceptionally talented umpire in her own right; winning the Joanne Cox Medal for Excellence at the AFL Vic Female Umpiring Academy this season – congratulations Shannon! 2015 saw the continuation of the



AFL's 'Green Shirt' program, requiring beginner umpires to wear a green coloured shirt in their first season to clearly indicate that they are learning, we actually require them to wear this until they have officiated <u>at least</u> 30 matches. Once 30 games are achieved, umpire competency was assessed to ensure that graduation to 'orange shirt' truly reflects a competent level of skill and knowledge.

The SMJFL Experienced Umpire Team was created in 2014, and the initiatives begun last year continued into 2015, enabling less experienced umpires to be matched and appointed with a mentor to provide 'on the spot' match day coaching. This program provides valuable outcomes: 1) additional coaching for young umpires as they make a step to a higher level of competition; and 2) development of mentoring skills in the more experienced umpires – recognising their skill, knowledge and experience and encouraging them to continue their much valued role in our junior organisation.



Just as players enjoy meeting, and learning from players who are playing at the highest level, so too do young umpires benefit from interacting with AFL umpires. 2015 saw our umpiring team visited by AFL field and boundary umpires, who participated in a training session, and shared their knowledge and passion for the role they play in football at an AFL level.

In 2014 the minimum age for umpire registration was raised from "must be at least in Year 7 of secondary school" to "must be at least in Year 8..." this has continued into 2015.

Our Appointments Coordinator Nick Bergman has done a spectacular job this year, with a fill rate of over 98% for the Home and Away season (based on games having at least 1 field umpire appointed), as well as ensuring 100% of field, boundary and goal umpires were supplied for all finals where required. This was despite our scheduling program having many hiccups early in the season which were beyond our control. One of our aims for next year will be to increase the number of boundary umpires appointed.



Treatment of Umpires

Once again, as per last season, abuse and intimidation of umpires flourished in 2015 – with team officials again featuring unacceptably high in the number of incidents / reports. Expectations of umpire perfection continues despite being wholly unrealistic and destined for disappointment. Several lengthy sentences were handed out to officials, and hopefully this will send a message to the competition that we will not tolerate any abuse (in any form) of our umpires – whether they are official SMJFL or our parent volunteers. Unfortunately, a few of these officials, even after going to tribunal and being found guilty, still could not see that what they had said or done was wrong, which was extremely disappointing.

2015 Season highlights

- Community Umpiring Round saw 4 of the SMJFL's "up and coming" umpires have the opportunity to participate in the AFL's "Game Day" experience at Etihad Stadium.
- AFL umpires Chris Donlon, Ian Burrows and Nick Brown attended SMJFL umpire training conducting a Q&A session and giving insights to AFL umpires.
- SMJFL umpires officiated the Vic Metro Junior Championships U15 (Div 2) Grand Final Logan Webster, Hamish McCartney and Ryan Vaux (field), Kyle Anderson and Wade Anderson (boundary), and James McCartney and Mark Vormwald (goal)
- VAFA Umpiring Director Brian Goodman attended training providing insight into senior umpiring and the pathways available for our more experienced umpires.

Award Winners

Not realised by most people is the fact that our umpires, like the players, have an awards night. This year, it was held at the Kingston City Hall on the 18th August. Guest speaker for the night was AFL field umpire Rob O'Gorman, who is himself an "old boy" of our league, having done his junior umpiring with the then, MSJFL. A terrific night was had by all, with a large crowd in attendance, and not one umpire booed all night!

Conclusion

2015 proved to be another year of change and growth for the umpiring department and the League as a whole. Our volunteer parent umpires are now an accepted part of the system and, by officiating the games of our developing young players, enable our "official" umpires to develop their skills by officiating the format of the game that they are more familiar with, which enables growth and development of the modified rules players by having adults on-field who encourage and guide their development.

The fact that, for two years now, 65% of the umpires registered in the SMJFL were at least in their 2nd year of umpiring is pleasing and makes us confident that the structure and training plan adopted back in 2013 is proving to be successful and, with persistence, should continue to benefit game day outcomes. We intend encouraging further recruitment of umpires by going back to the 2014 model and making at least 2 training sessions available to all umpires.

If we had one aim for 2016 it would be not to have even one official reported for umpire abuse. When coaches in particular begin to realise that if umpires



are respected and not abused they will umpire in a more relaxed manner, allowing them to better control the game, then we will begin to truly move forward. Umpires are not responsible for player behaviour – coaches are!

Recognition and thanks is due to the umpire coaching team and game day mentors, led by Head Coach David Anselmi - coaches Phil Scott, Nick Bergman, Shannon Kirkby, Asha Hinton and Sam Bridges have put so much time, energy and passion into making our umpires as good as they can be, and ensured our League is highly regarded in umpiring circles.

The Umpiring Department is grateful for the continued support of the SMJFL Board and member clubs, along with that extended to us by AFL Victoria, the Southern Football and Netball League, the Southern Umpires Association, and the Victorian Amateur Football Association.

Finally, I would like to thank Olivia Crowe who began this season and did the hard work setting it all up as Director of Umpiring before having to relinquish the position due to her health. We all hope she is well on the road to recovery. As well, a large debt of gratitude is owed to Bernadette Vaux, who stepped in to hold the fort until Olivia's replacement could be found — as always Bernie did a spectacular job. I am looking forward to the challenge of 2016 and can't wait for Round 1 to roll around so our umpires can once again show the world just how good they are.

Commercial Operations Report

SMJFL Partners' Program

The SMJFL Partners Program continues to provide a significant benefit to member clubs, with the total net revenue providing a \$422.88 discount per team to Clubs. This means that for many clubs, the Partners Program will be the major sponsor for the Club.

The ongoing success of the Partners Program allows the SMJFL to provide member clubs with the:

- Lowest team affiliation fees of any independent junior football league in Melbourne
- Lowest apparel prices (jumpers, shorts & socks) of any junior football league in Melbourne
- Lowest Sherrin match football prices of any junior football league in Melbourne
- Equal lowest Grand Final (adult) ticket prices of any league in Melbourne

The league thanks all member clubs for their ongoing support of the Partners Program.

Merchandise

Net merchandise profit reduced from \$92,143 in 2014 to \$69,308 in 2015. This was expected as the 2014 result included one-off apparel purchases for Clubs. The 2015 result is slightly enhanced due to Clubs purchasing Sherrin match footballs. It's anticipated that 2016 football purchases will be slightly lower as Clubs may have existing stock to use in 2016.

Sponsorship

While overall sponsorship for the year is slightly down, the net profit margin on sponsorships is up, meaning the league has never been in a stronger commercial position than it is right now.

Grants

Grants increased in 2015 courtesy of funding acquired for the SMJFL Sustainability Strategy Project. The SMJFL would like to thank the project funding partners; AFL Victoria, Bayside Council & Kingston Council.

Corporate Partners

The SMJFL is fortunate to have the wonderful support of 28 corporate partners & suppliers. The success of the SMJFL could not be achieved without their ongoing support and a full list of the SMJFL partners is listed later in the annual report.

Representative Football – Interleague Report

This year's Interleague campaign saw many new achievements. The renamed South Metro Stars were prepped and ready for the 2015 Interleague Campaign. The SMJFL had decided in 2014 that the SMJFL Interleague teams needed new identity and brand; a name to cheer and a song to sing when victorious. This new look also saw a re-design of the Interleague uniform to clearly distinguish SMJFL from opponents.

Furthermore, the SMJFL took over the management of the U14 and U15 Interleague competition, which was previously organised by the Sandringham Dragons in joint partnership with the SMJFL., The SMJFL now fully administers the entire SMJFL Interleague program.

2015 saw two divisions in the U13, U14 and U15 age groups, with one U16 Youth Girls team. Over 450 players across the SMJFL were nominated for the Interleague program. All SMJFL clubs with eligible teams nominated players for the Interleague competition with each age group having over 70 per cent of SMJFL clubs represented in the final squads.

Under 17 - Colts

The most recent representative competition was the U17 Colts Challenge Shield match played in September. The SMJFL participated in the inaugural match against a Yarra Junior Football League (YJFL) team. The South Metro Colts were a representative team, with every club with an Under 17 team nominating players for selection. The match saw our players perform valiantly under immense pressure from the YJFL, but in the end the Yarra side won the inaugural shield by 30 points. The Best On Ground for



the SMJFL side was Tom Maloney from South Melbourne Districts.

Under 16 - Girls

For the second year, the U16 Youth Girls team participated in the AFL Victoria Metro Junior Championships, with coach Laura Kane leading the girls to their first victory. After being defeated in their first two games to YJFL 1 side and the South East Juniors (SEJ) respectively, they managed to overcome the YJFL 2 side by 47 points. A great moment of the tournament was seeing the girls sing the Stars' team song for the first time. Leora Elias, Abbey Goullet, Bryanna Arnold and Isabel Molino were awarded for their spectacular efforts during the girls' campaign.







Under 15 - Boys

SMJFL's U15 South Metro Stars had some tough battles in their AFL Victoria Metro Junior Championships. Without nine Division 1 players from the 2014 U14 squad, it was always going to be a learning curve for the U15s about the skill level and determination of the top-grade interleague players from YJFL, the Essendon Districts (EDFL) and the Eastern Football League (EFL). The Division 1 side, led by Coach Nathan Beaumont, saw a draw in their first match against the EDFL, a huge improvement in the



2014 27-point loss to the side. The next two games in this year's competition saw the Stars going down by 77 and 50 points to YJFL and EFL respectively. Standouts for the U15 Div 1 team were Sam Forbes, Joel Crocker, William Kennedy and Hugo Read.

The U15 Division 2 side also had a challenge ahead of them, however they were able to claim victory over their EDFL opponents by seven points. Again beating their performance of a five-point loss to the side in 2014. The next two games were a test for the stars of how victories can be claimed quickly. The next match saw the U15 Division 2 Stars unable to overcome the first-quarter dominance of the YJFL team, going down by 32 points. While the Round 3 match saw the EFL break free from the closely fought match and win by 16. Under 14 – Boys

After wins over both the EDFL and the EFL during the Championships, the U14 Division 1 Stars faced off against the YJFL in the Grand Final. The team, coached by Sam Calogero, were focused on the process of each game rather than the scoreboard results throughout their competition. YJFL, being undefeated for the whole competition, were a difficult side to face in the last match. In the Grand Final, the Stars were only down by 12 points at quarter time and the match

could have gone either way. During the second quarter, the Stars came out firing to level the scores, sending a fierce message to the Yarra side. However YJFL managed to pile on the goals towards the end of the second quarter and dominated the play for the rest of the match, claiming the Grand Final victory. Under 13 - Boys

The U13 Interleague Carnival for SMJFL's two U13 teams was held at Bulleen Park in June. The Division 1 team, coached by Bill Leggett, won their first match against SEJ, but was defeated by the YJFL in the second match by 39 points. Jake Bowey, Lachlan Riley, Liam Kirkwood-Scott and Darby Hipwell received acknowledgements during the day. The U13 Division 2 side was able to claim the silverware for SMJFL for the first time since 2013. After winning their first match



against YJFL by an impressive six-goal margin, they managed to work well in the second match to have a 98-point victory over SEJ. Tom Williams, Zac Buckley, Oliver Lord and Castan Racunica were voted the best players throughout the competition.



1. Significant Accounting Policies

a. Incorporation

South Metro Junior Football League Inc. was incorporated on 5 January 2009.

b. Basis of preparation

The financial report is a general purpose financial report that has been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards, Interpretations and other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board and the Associations Incorporations Reform Act 2012.

The financial report of South Metro Junior Football League Inc. as an individual entity complies with Australian Equivalents to International Financial Reporting Standards. Compliance with Australian Equivalents to International Financial Reporting Standards ensures that the financial statements and notes comply with International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS).

The financial report has been prepared under the historical cost convention modified by revaluations of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities for which the fair value basis of accounting has been applied.

The following is a summary of the material accounting policies adopted by the league in the preparation and presentation of the financial report. The accounting policies have been consistently applied, unless otherwise stated.

c. Accounting policies

i. Revenue

Affiliation fees and sponsorships are recognised as revenue on a time proportional basis.

Revenue from the sale of goods, is recognized when the significant risks and rewards of ownership of the goods have passed to the buyer and the costs incurred or to be incurred in respect of the transaction can be measured reliably. Risks and rewards of ownership are considered as having passed to the buyer upon the delivery of goods to customers.

Revenues from the provision of services are recognised upon delivery of the service.

Grant revenue is recognised in the income statement when it is controlled. When there are conditions attached to grant revenue relating to the use of those grants for specific purposes it is recognised in the balance sheet as a liability until such conditions are met or services provided.

Interest revenue is recognised on a proportional basis taking into account the interest rates applicable to the financial assets.



for the year ended 31 October 2015 (continued)

i. Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at-call with banks and other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less.

ii. Inventories

Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

iii. Financial instruments

Receivables

Trade and other receivables when initially recognised are measured at fair value, which normally approximates their nominal value. Subsequently they are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method.

Payables

Trade and other accounts payable are recognised when the association becomes obliged to make future payments resulting from the purchase of goods or services. When initially recognised they are measured at fair value, which normally approximates their nominal value. Subsequently they are measured at amortised cost.

iv. Property, plant and equipment

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost or fair value as indicated less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses.

Depreciation

The depreciable amount of items of property, plant and equipment are depreciated on a straight line basis over their estimated useful lives commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

The assets' residual values and useful lives of assets are reviewed at each balance sheet date and adjusted if appropriate.

No Provision for Income Tax has been raised, as the entity is exempt from Income Tax under Division 50 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

iv. Goods and services tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Tax Office (ATO).

In these circumstances, the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of the expense.


